Some of the best photographs of eagles taken in the world have been captured at the Conowingo Dam. During migration periods, photographers from around the globe pour into Fisherman's Park to capture the nation's favorite raptor at home and at work.

Photos of eagles flying, fishing and fighting over the mighty Susquehanna River are treasured.

The birding crowds may have diminished slightly now (perhaps they've headed up to Alaska?), but your opportunities for great eagle photos have not. Plenty of resident eagles provide opportunities from dawn to dusk.

During a recent visit, I felt a little silly aiming my cell phone skyward while the sounds of 50 sports cameras with lenses longer than my very long arms clicked away. In the end, no one cared. Not the professionals, not me and certainly not the birds. My photos didn't look like the magazine cover, but hey, it was a spontaneous visit.

In addition to the stars of the show, there are many other species to see. According to the Maryland Ornithological Society:

The primary birding attractions at the dam are Bald Eagles, herons, gulls and waterfowl. Large numbers of Bald Eagles gather there starting in October through

mid-March, to take advantage of the food availability. In the past, many thousands of gulls also gathered in winter at Conowingo, providing an opportunity to search for rarities. However, the numbers of gulls have declined in recent years for unknown reasons.

The forested area that fills the triangle between Shuresville Road, Shures Landing Road, and the river is busy with songbirds almost year-round. The edges of this area can be birded from the parking lot at Fisherman's Park and by walking (very cautiously!) along Shure's Landing and Shuresville Roads. A section of the 193-mile long Mason-Dixon Trail traverses this area. The northbound section of the Mason Dixon Trail can be accessed from near the Conowingo Dam Visitor Center, located on the north side of US Route 1 just west of the dam (Visitor Center address is 4948 Conowingo Rd, Conowingo, MD 21918). Ask at the Visitor Center for directions to the trailhead. The Mason-Dixon Trail is marked by blue blazes and identified by small circular metal discs with the trail logo. The trail passes through beautiful forest with many wildflowers among the understory and ground cover, and can be quite birdy in spring. The areas around Glen Cove Marina and Broad

Creek Marinas are particularly productive and offer viewpoints of "Conowingo Lake", the water reservoir above the dam.

Fisherman's Park is the northern terminus of a foot trail, part of the Lower Susquehanna Heritage Greenway or The Wildflower Trail, which runs south along the west bank of the river for about 3 miles, ending at the Deer Creek Picnic Area in Susquehanna State Park. The trail goes through river bottom forest and wetland areas, with intermittent views of the river. There are several Bald Eagle nests visible from the trail. Prothonotary Warblers also nest here. The trail is famous for the wildflowers that blanket the rocky cliffs on the west side of the trail in early spring: Virginia Bluebells, Dutchman's Breeches, Drooping Trillium, Wild Ginger, and other species.

Although Conowingo is best known for gulls and eagles, it hosts a wide diversity of birds, with over 220 species reported on eBird. The county line between Harford and Cecil County is about halfway across the river, running parallel to the shores and skirting the northeast edge of Rowland Island, the long, narrow island just south of the dam, with a couple of power-line towers on it. A lot of the birds may be on the Cecil

County side, particularly waterfowl swimming through channels in the extensive rocky area on the Cecil shore; gulls and eagles roosting on the rocks; herons, egrets, Ospreys and eagles in the trees; and eagles, Ospreys, and other raptors on the power-line towers. There is no public access to the dam from the Cecil County side, but a view of the river below the dam can be obtained from the Octoraro River Trail at Conowingo Park in Cecil County.

Bald Eagles are the big story at Conowingo Dam and attract many visitors. A portion of the eagles seen here are nesting individuals; there are nests up and down the river, including some in trees on islands in the river. Some eagles are present year-round but begin arriving in greater numbers in mid-October and remain through mid-March. High counts for a single winter day may exceed 250 individuals. Look everywhere for eagles: flying overhead, perched in trees on the opposite shore, in trees at Fisherman's Park, on the power towers on the island and across the river, on rocks below the dam, and all along the length of the river. Very rarely, a Golden Eagle may drop in but they usually do not linger.

Whatever Floats Your Boat

I have a confession to make. I pretend to know a lot more about the world we live in than I really do. As a reasonably intelligent adult who's lived on this earth for nearly three-quarters of a century, I've found that it's important to give the impression of a person who understands the physical laws of our planet. People expect it. But if the truth be known, I blindly accept a lot of things that I really don't understand.

Ironically, one of those less-than-fully-understood laws is "The Law Of Buoyancy"..... the physical law that explains why some things float and others don't. As a boating writer for the past 20 years, I've felt compelled to act like I understood this one completely. I mean, come on ... if a boating writer doesn't understand why things float and sink, then who does?

For Archimedes, a mathematician from ancient Greece who is credited with discovering the "principle" over 2,000 years ago, it was as plain as the nose on your face. So obvious, in fact, that he stated it in just 26 words:

"Any object, wholly or partially immersed in a fluid, is buoyed up by a force equal to the weight of the fluid displaced by the object."

Say what?

When I was a kid, it was simple. Light things floated and heavy things sank. And when it came to boats, they floated because they were made of wood, just like that 18-foot ChrisCraft that we use to water ski behind on the Bohemia River back in the 50s.

Over the decades since



taking high school physics, though, I've tried to convince myself, and anybody willing to listen, that I understood the science and could apply it if needed. A summer trip through Nova Scotia a few years back made me realize that, in reality, I haven't progressed much beyond that "boats float because they're wooden" mentality.

While traveling through Nova Scotia's Cape Breton Island, we decided to go for an advertised sail one afternoon on gorgeous Bras d'Or Lake. The boat was a beautiful 67-foot wishbone schooner named "Amoeba" and her capable captain's name was John.

As Captain John motored out of the harbor that afternoon, with the sun glistening off the wave tops and the eagles diving for an early fish dinner, we knew that a special day lay ahead. As the sails quickly filled, Captain John told us a little about his beloved family-owned schoo-

ner, Amoeba. She was a labor of love, he told us, built by his father over a 10-year period in a pole shed behind their family home. Her weight was 36 ton, with 12 ton of ballast and her hull was made of ferrocement.

"Ferrocement......did he say the hull is made of CEMENT? I wonder how deep it is here." My thoughts were not those of a mature boating writer who understood the law of buoyancy, but rather those of a naive child who knew that a cement boat should sink like a rock.

After quelling my initial anxiety, I was surprised and a little embarrassed by my reaction, albeit internal. It wasn't as if I wasn't aware of ferrocement hull construction. I knew it had been a successful method of boat building for decades. But I had never sailed on one before that day and, down deep (no pun intended), I still didn't quite understand how a 72,000-pound concrete sailboat

could float.....and so beautifully, at that.

Now that I've gotten that off my chest, let's take a close look at Archimedes principle and see if we can make some sense out of those 26 words.

"Any object, wholly or partially immersed in a fluid" seems straight forward enough

"is buoyed up by a force equal to the weight of the fluid displaced by the object" - here's the hard part.

Using our beautiful ferrocement schooner as the immersed object, the force that "buoyed up" Amoeba and kept her afloat had to be more than her weight of 72,000 pounds. If not, she'd sink.

That force, according to Archimedes, was provided by the weight of the water that was displaced by her hull as it protruded down into the water. Since a cubic foot of water weighs about 63 lbs., we need to figure out how many cubic feet of water would need to be displaced to equal 72,000 lbs. of force. Using simple division: 72,000 divided by 63 = 1,142.85 cubic feet of water

There you have it. If Amoeba's hull displaces over 1,143 cubic feet of water, she floats. If she displaces 1,142 cubic feet of water or less, she sinks. Pretty simple, huh? Not really, because we haven't allowed for the weight of the cargo and passengers.


I don't know about you, but my brain's getting tired. I think I'll go out and buy a wooden boat and forget about it. Everybody knows wood floats, ya know!


Women on the Water

Her family supported her small business and pushed her to follow that passion, too. For years Jennifer had used "the brackish life" as her logo but then someone trademarked it and Jennifer had to come up with a new name for her brand. So, Jennifer's dad helped her come up with the Semi Salty Life logo; a small play on words, brackish water is semi-salty, after all, and she had used this logo for about 10 years before receiving the trademark for it.


Semi Salty Life is Jennifer's own line of apparel, though she does create gear for fishing charters, a welding company, and, of course, the marina and restaurant. What's Hiding Under That Rock?

It's dark and cool, the water is moving swiftly over the rock you're hiding under. You catch sight of a large crayfish headed your way. Wait for it.... bam! That's lunch.

Can you guess the creature that lives this way in the clear cool tributaries of the Susquehanna and Youghiogheny Rivers? If you guessed the Hellbender I'd be impressed. The Eastern Hellbender is nocturnal and lives nearly its whole life under rocks in clear streams. With spotted gray to brown skin the Hellbender blends in perfectly with the stream bed, making ambushing prey a breeze. They prefer crawfish and small fish but will eat shrimp and

earthworms in captivity. In the wild, they can live to be 25 years old.

Pollution and excess sediment create unsuitable habitat for the largest salamander in North America and are partly the reason it has been listed as endangered in Maryland.


While a sighting of this 1-2-foot-long amphibian is unlikely, you might catch a glimpse on cloudy days or during the breeding season in September and October. Females lay 200-400 eggs in a softball-sized mass that gets fertilized externally by the male. Males dig nesting sites under rocks and guard the site for two and a half months until they hatch. As larvae they are most

vulnerable, leaving the nest as soon as possible to avoid being eaten by the father.

If you have the rare chance of finding a Hellbender, they aren't so easy to hold onto. But not to worry their mucus is just slippery not toxic! Their mucus-covered bodies may protect them from parasites and make them distasteful to potential predators. As young larvae almost anything will eat them, but as adults, they have few predators, mainly raccoons, minks, and river otters.

Avoid Trailer Troubles

Earlier this week dispatch received a call for a sinking 20' power boat. After the crew launched the boat, they realized that they had forgotten to put the plug back in but not quickly enough to keep the engine from getting wet and shutting down. Our dispatch talked them through the emergency, the tow boat arrived in record time, and we towed them safely back to the ramp. That's when it hit me that a "Trailering Refresher" might be helpful.

Before trailering your boat inspect the hitch, chains, and electrical connections. Do the "walk-around" and make sure the brake and signal lights are operating. Check to make sure your tires, and your spare, are properly inflated and still in good condition. Check that the boat is properly supported, and all bow/stern tie downs are in place. Your engine should be trimmed up for travel. And, before you hit the road, make sure the plug is back in and seated properly.

Once at the ramp parking lot and before you back down the ramp, remove the straps, disconnect the electrical, and double check the plug. While still in the parking lot, load your gear and decide whether you want a crew member on board. This is the time to raise the antenna and bimini top, find your keys and kill switch lanyard, turn on your batteries, and get out fenders and dock lines if you need them. Don't be that person who blocks others at the ramp because you are not prepared.

Once all the above has been taken care of, you are ready to back down the ramp. When the boat is halfway in the water, pause to remove the hitch safety chain and the winch strap, and then back down until the boat transom floats. The crew member on board can lower the engine and manage the dock lines with the rest of your crew while you park the truck and trailer.

Most of you know about our on the water towing membership but did you know that BoatUS offers a Trailer Assist membership that helps you out when you are on the road? It's just an extra \$15 a year and provides up to 100 miles of towing for both vehicle and boat trailer along with other roadside assistance benefits. If you are headed out on your boat be prepared with BoatU.S. Trailer Assist for on the road and TowBoatU.S. for on the water. As always, happy to help.



The Hub is open on Saturdays and Sundays from May to September. The hours are 1-4 p.m. but do change seasonally. The Hub is a very large open barn area with walk-

an area just outside for the food trucks. You can find the food truck schedule and the current season's hours of operation on their website at brokenspokewinery.com. Now let's talk about the wine. The Broken Spoke does grow some of its own grapes but also sources from other local Maryland vineyards and then turns that into delicious wines served on premises and available at local retailers. If you are into reds then you might want to try Revel Red (Barbera), Banter Red (merlot), Babble Barbera (Oaked Barbera), and Rumors (cab sauvignon & Merlot). These were beyond delicious with a lot of cherries, plums, and vanilla.


But as the weather warms, I am more of a white wine girl. Grunting Gruner was a hit. The deliciously





Bald Eagles Are The Big Story

Ospreys also nest here, in abundance, and are present from March through September. There are usually large numbers of Black and Turkey Vultures festooning the metal superstructure above the dam and perhaps congregating on the ground in the parking lot; the proportions vary but as of December 2019, the Black Vultures far outnumber the Turkey Vultures. A nesting pair of Peregrine Falcons also hangs out in the metal superstructure above the dam and can be seen chasing Rock Pigeons.

Gulls may be present from December through February. The gulls, like the eagles, can be everywhere – in the air, on the rocks, and swimming in the water. A favorite perch for gulls is the wing-wall that projects outward from the dam; any gulls lined up there are easy to scope and check for rarities. The usual suspects are Ring-billed Gulls, Herring, and Great Blackbacked; Lesser Black-backed are also expected here. Laughing Gulls are present in the warmer

months. Bonaparte's Gulls are typical in winter, but numbers vary; look for them flying downriver in early morning and upriver in late afternoon. There have been occasional sightings of rare gulls such as Iceland, Sabine's, and Blacklegged Kittiwake, among others.

A Great Blue Heron rookery can be seen on the Cecil side of the Susquehanna, directly opposite Fisherman's Park. The rookery is active in the warm months. In winter, large numbers of Great Blue Herons and a few Black-crowned Night-Herons can be found roosting on the large island just south of the dam (Rowland Island) – look carefully on the rocky sides of the island and on the level ground at the top of the island, and in the trees. Herons will also be dispersed among the large rocks just below the dam, yearround.

Bird along the edge of the woods adjacent to Fisherman's Park and scan the sycamore trees along the riverbank, watching for orioles, vireos,

warblers, and flycatchers in spring and summer. In winter look for woodpeckers, kinglets, Brown Creepers, and Winter Wrens. These birds can also be found along the Lower Susquehanna Heritage Greenway Trail/Wildflower Trail south of Fisherman's Park. The trail is also great for breeding flycatchers, vireos, warblers, and orioles in late spring and summer.

Final Notes:

The Wildflower trailhead is closed at this time. A lot of vulture carcasses have been found and the cause of their death is under investigation.


Pay attention to all warning signs and prevent the spread of any diseases including avian flu. And laugh if you must, but if you are going to be there for a long time worry about your windshield wipers. I've never seen it happen, but apparently, the birds have a taste for vulcanized rubber. Who knew?













Tips For Springtime Paddle Power

Spring waters are going to be fun for canoeing and kayaking. As the weather warms, the call of the rivers, lakes, and bays will only get louder. Smaller boats can be placed into the water easily. Bigger boats and power boats need a boat ramp or some ingenuity. A gradual, sloped beach can be a perfect access ramp. Small watercraft can be hoisted onto your shoulder or carried with a friend.

Safe Paddling is important when on the wild and open waters of Maryland. Plan for emergencies. If you think for one moment "That will never happen to me", it will. Here are some tips to help you safely enjoy paddling, rowing, or motoring.

WEAR A PFD

Personal Floating Devices are essential. You may be a great swimmer until you bang your head. Keep the PFD buckled and fit correctly. There is no excuse not to wear one. Inflatable versions are more compact and will automatically inflate when needed.

HAVE A PLAN

Know where you are going before you launch. Let others know your plans. Leave a note on the windshield about what, when wear, etc. your cruise will take you. Weather can quickly change your trip and emergencies happen. You may not be able to get a cell phone signal. Keep your phone or satellite locator in a waterproof sack on your person. Solo boating is dangerous.

DRESS FOR SAFETY

Wear proper gear that includes a brimmed hat/ helmet, polaroid sunglasses, PFD, Sunscreen, helmets, proper shoes for traction and support, and layered clothes that are not water absorbent. Gloves and knee pads are a good idea. Bring plenty of fluids and energy snacks. A simple First Aid kit is important. Simple abrasions and cuts can get infected quickly in moist environments.

KNOW the DANGERS

If you are planning to navigate a river, learn where the rapids are. Scout the route ahead of time. Flood waters may be more challenging and riskier.

PAY ATTENTION

Stay alert when boating. Always avoid dangerous areas and obstructions. Logs, sweepers, rocks, and debris can flip your boat in a hurry. Watch for wakes and waves. Wind can be a problem. Carry a whistle, airhorn, and flashlight to signal for help.

BE CONSIDERATE OF OTHERS

You will not be the only boater on the water. Keep a safe distance from others and give them the right of way. Keep the areas cleaner than you found them.

NEVER BOAT AND DRINK

Alcohol slows down your reflexes, impacts reasoning, lowers the body temperature, and is responsible for many boat accidents. Drink after the boating is done.

PLAN TO GET WET

Expect the unexpected. Take some time to train your family, friends, and crew. Purposefully flip the boat and make reasonable rescues. Do this in slower, shallower water that is not as dangerous. Learn how to flip the boats and de-water them. Pull one swamped canoe across the mid-section of another. Hop back into a boat, kayak, or canoe while in deep water. Know what a 3-point stance is and practice this. Make your clothes into a buoyant float. Practice CPR. Practice throwing a rescue throw bag. All these skills can be found on YouTube and in Scouting handbooks.

COLD WATER CAN KILL YOU

Most hypothermia deaths happen in warmer temperatures over 70 degrees. Practice fire building while you are wet and cold. Learn how to get warm after being in freezing waters. Have a dry bag ready with dry clothes and a towel. Hats are important since most heat is lost from the head. Know the H.E.L.P. posture. Heat Escape Lessening Posture. This means huddle and get into a fetal position to conserve heat.

Safe boating is your responsibility. Know the regulations that apply to your watercraft. If you have never been trained in safe boating skills, hire a Guide, or find a Mentor to teach you how to safely enjoy our wild waters! Find a local boating club to learn more about safe and fun ways to enjoy the Bay watershed safely.



If you have been following our young waterman, Luke McFadden, on his social media: fvsoutherngirl on TikTok, @luke_mcfad on Instagram, and Bodkin Point Seafood on Facebook, you will understand the title of this month's article. If not let me catch you up.

When I last spoke to Luke he was gaining popularity on TikTok for his humorous yet educational videos on being a waterman and crabber. It was his lifelong passion to be a crabber and he remembers claiming his future career in writing in his 5th-grade yearbook.

Fast forward to 2023 and you will find him partnering with TJ Sanders of Cruise the Chesapeake and Anne Arundel County Public Schools to bring his love of crabbing and our local waterways to young children.

The group wants to bring no-cost field trips to elementary school-aged kids in Anne Arundel County that will teach them about the bay, the ecology, and where their food comes from. To do this they had to create a curriculum pertaining to the trip. This was done by a local teacher who created a fourth-grade curriculum. But there is still a big challenge for this program. In order to do this the group has started a GoFundMe to raise the needed funds to provide these experiences at no cost to the students. The link to donate is: https://gofund.me/9c190c45



Even in these early stages, the program has been a success with the 4th graders at Bodkin Elementary. The first groups went out on the Magothy River at the beginning of May and the experience will be one they talk about forever. On one trip the schedules didn't line up to watch Luke crab so he just hopped on the 46-foot Samantha Belle with the group; bringing his crab pot and some crabs with him. The kids were super excited to have him onboard.






