

## THE NOT-SO-ELUSIVE snakehead entrée

Originally native to parts of Africa and Asia, there are many species of snakehead. The Northern Snakehead in particular is native to east particularly China, Asia, Russia, North and South Korea. It was first found in Maryland in 2002 in a Crofton Pond in Anne Arundel County. Like many aquarium pets, when they get too big some people release them into local ponds or streams. While snakeheads have been introduced to non-native areas for over 100 years for food, that wasn't the case here.

Snakeheads aren't particularly sneaky, but they have an unusual adaptation that makes their invasions so widespread. They have a special adaptation that allows them to breathe air, not just water. When on land they gulp air and "army-crawl" to find new ponds. They are able to survive for four days on land. Making them keenly adapted to be an invasive species.

The northern snakeheads were well established in the Potomac River in 2004 and have since spread throughout the Chesapeake Bay. Many attempts to get their numbers under control. Have been undertaken. For example, fishing tour-



naments with prizes for the most fish caught, fish frys, laws against transporting live individuals, and commercial licenses to catch and sell. All of these are great ways to promote the demand for this invasive fish with the hopes of reducing their numbers.

So as a concerned environmentalist, I was keen to try one! While they are not particularly sly in the wild, snakeheads have found a way to avoid my plate. Over four years ago I was told that the annual company picnic would have food trucks including snakehead tacos. Since I'd been hearing about this fish for years I was beyond excited. Then a few days before the event, I got the terrible news that my grandfather had passed away. Now don't get me wrong, attending his funeral was way more important than fish tacos, but I was bummed because afterward, all my coworkers mentioned how good those tacos tasted. I figured they'd be mainstream soon and I'd get my chance.

Fast forward a few years and insert a pandemic...

I'm at my second graduation party of the day. I walk up to the spread, and see a few serving trays with Sterno keeping something warm. Knowing my family, it was probably something delicious - and assuredly local! On the lid, written in Sharpie I see "Snakehead." Could I be that lucky? I lift the lid, steam rises... on an empty pan. I'm thwarted again!

A few days later my husband and I were in Bel Air looking for a new place to eat and found a restaurant (One Eleven Main) that uses local ingredients when possible. Lo and behold, one of the special appetizers listed was breaded snakehead! This not-so-elusive fish had finally found its way to a plate in front of me. It was a nice and juicy, flaky white fish that I was happy to eat every bite of. Supporting a local restaurant, sustainable fishing, and local waterman jobs - a meal can't get much better than that.

This August, six childhood friends will venture offshore. to fish in honor of women battling breast cancer. The "Reel Angels" have been fundraising within their community to raise money for breast cancer research and will represent their hometown during the 28th annual Poor Girls Open. The PGO is a ladies-only, billfish-release tournament that will be held at Bahia Marina in Ocean City, MD, August 17-19.

The Reel Angels will be represented by Gina Maxwell, Michele Koenig, Carla MacCord, Janell Rotella, Nicole Mills, and Kristi Neuschafer. "We have fished and crabbed the Chesapeake Bay and various rivers in Baltimore County for many years, so traveling 100 miles offshore as a team will be a real treat! In fact, three of our ladies have never been offshore. There is definitely a blend of nervousness, excitement, curiosity and determination. While every crew dreams of catching the 'big one' the true motivator is to support other women who are fighting a much bigger fight, says Gina. Many of the team's loved ones have been affected by cancer. Sadly, Kristi's sister-in-law, Tonya Neuschafer, lost her battle with breast cancer in 2016. "I will be fishing in her honor and she will be forever missed," says Kristi.

It not only affects the lives of the patients but the lives of the families. "I have personally been called back for further mammography imaging, followed by nine breast biopsies...NINE!" Gina says.

"Life can change in a split second and I naturally assumed the worst. After several very long days of awaiting the results, I was fortunate enough to receive good news."

The Reel Angels will repre sent the strength of those who have lost their battle with cancer, as well as those still undergoing treatment.

Each registered team is permitted to fish one day of the three. The tournament grows every year, with well over 100 boats. Entry fees are donated directly to the American Cancer Society. In addition, money is raised throughout the event with raffles, silent auctions, apparel sales, and other fun events. Spectators fill the venue at FishTales and Bahia Marina eagerly awaiting the return of each team and the lucky ladies who have fish worthy of a "weigh-in". Tuna, mahi-mahi, and wahoo hold their own sub-categories in the tournament. The heaviest of each species will place among the top 3 on the leader board. Any & billfish caught during the tournament (white marlin, blue marlin, swordfish, and sailfish) must be called in, recorded for points, and re-

leased. Length and weight are not taken in this category. Instead, the number of total releases is tallied, along with a point value for each species of billfish.

The Poor Girls Open will be broadcasted live. Viewers will have a front-row seat at the weigh-ins and will catch many interviews with the ladies. Many teams also participate in the best-dressed; contest, which inevitably fuels the excitement during the tournament! "Our team will share some highlights on social media. We will also acknowledge any sponsors that supported our team this year." The Reel Angels will graciously be accepting donations until August 19, 2023. Donations can be sent through Venmo, using the QR code below. No matter the outcome of the tournament, we have already won. Friends, fishing, fun, and fundraising to fight cancer.



"Or," the thought process continued, "I could be spending the day down at the beach, stretched out shoulder to shoulder, hip to hip with that mass of humanity that evacuates the cities every summer weekend for their 'fun in the sun'." As a teenager, when I had a body, I didn't mind displaying and wasn't too embarrassed being caught appreciating some of the other bodies on display, the beach was a great place to pass the time.

In fact, it was the center of activity for our raging-hormone crowd. But the hormones stopped raging decades ago and, without that motivation, putting up with the crowds is more than I can bare.

I need to be an active participant in my pastime. I need to be involved physically in an activity that demands certain skills to be proficient.

Watching TV sports just doesn't do that.

"Aren't you going to tack now, Hon?", came Peg's anxious voice, shaking me from my reverie.

As we came about and headed off on a new tack, I began to summarize. "My ideal pastime MUST:

1) LEAVE ME HAPPY AND REFRESHED...unlike golf.

2) BE AWAY FROM THE MADDEN-ING CROWDS... unlike the beach.

3) OFFER THRILLS AND A SENSE OF ADVENTURE...unlike hobbies.

#### MARYLAND DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES CERTIFIES TWO NEW CLEAN MARINAS

#### The Maryland Department of Natural Resources has awarded Clean Marina certification to HILLTOP MARINA IN BALTIMORE COUNTY AND BOHEMIA BAY YACHT HARBOUR IN CECIL COUNTY.

There are now 147 certified Clean Marinas in Maryland, representing about 30 percent of the marinas in the state. The Clean Marina designation is awarded to marinas that comply with all applicable regulatory requirements and voluntarily adopt a significant portion of recommended best practices in the Maryland Clean Marina Guidebook.

**HILLTOP MARINA** co-owner Gary Moler operates the small "slips only" marina on Hopkins Creek off the Middle River in Essex. With minimal amenities and no staff, this marina is considered a "Clean Marina Partner." Moler has taken steps to prevent pollution such as preparing an emergency response plan, assembling a spill response kit, and sharing clean boating tips with his slip holders. At **BOHEMIA BAY YACHT HARBOUR** in Chesapeake City, General Manager Ken Long and his team have voluntarily taken spill prevention and response training, they maintain a stormwater pond and berm system to capture stormwater and any sediment or debris, and they offer single-stream recycling as part of their Clean Marina efforts.

Marinas, boatyards, and yacht clubs of any size are encouraged to pursue Clean Marina certification to help reduce pollutants in the Chesapeake Bay watershed. The Clean Marina tools, including the guidebook and an award checklist, are available on the Department of Natural Resources website. 

#### Spotlight on Jackie Wheeler

This month I had the pleasure of speaking with Ms. Jackie Wheeler. Jackie grew up working for her parents at Miller's Island Propeller, Inc. Her parents bought the property in 1971 when Jackie was just 12 and her brother was 11. The property located at the Patapsco River and Chesapeake Bay junction was originally a tavern. Her father tore down the tavern to make way for a foundry.

What originally started as a foundry and propeller reconditioning shop has expanded throughout the years to include a machine shop and a distribution service. In 1999, the company purchased the historic Bethlehem Steel Wire Stranding Mill, which has rail service, and increased its manufacturing and warehouse space significantly.

Jackie has fond memories of watching her dad work in the foundry. She and her brother spent their summers working in the business when they weren't busy with sports or school. Jackie was a lacrosse player as a child. When she was old enough to drive, Jackie began picking up the propellers for repair. Jackie often ran up into Delaware and then worked her way down through Rock Hall and Tolchester. Jackie remembers spending four days a week meeting with marina owners and her fifth

day was spent working in the office, where she answered phones, and worked on processing invoices and payroll.

Jackie is proud that her family has been able to continue the business after her parents passing. Her brother owns the business, one nephew runs the foundry, and another does the accounting, while Jackie works mainly in the office. They have a staff of three full-time drivers and one part-time driver who do twice weekly pick-ups and deliveries to marinas and marine businesses. They have also expanded their pick-ups into New Jersey.

Millers Island offers stateof-the-art propellers from Michigan Wheel, VEEM, Volvo Penta, and Chesapeake propellers, as well as struts, rudders, couplings, packing boxes, and underwater hardware. They custom-build stainless-steel struts and rudders and cast reproductions of discontinued parts.

## CATCHING BLUE CRABS

Maryland steamed crabs are tasty and fun to catch. Marylanders love to feast and fish for these "beautiful swimmers". There are many places and ways to catch these critters. Summertime is the best time to take some kids out to fill a bushel. Blue Crabs are known as "Callinectes Sapidus". This Greek word means hard shelled, bound, jointed and savory. Crabs are clawed and have pincers that need to be avoided. Fingers and toes are the most common targets. Every kid will figure that out when they pester a crab or get too close. Keep some Band-aids handy.

#### THERE ARE SEVERAL WAYS TO CATCH MARYLAND BLUE CRABS.

**TROT LINES** Most trot liners use 100-yard lines that have a bait every 3-6 feet apart. Sturdy baits like eel and bull lips last longer when salted. The heavy cord is anchored at each end and marked with a buoy. The boat will need a roller attachment that lifts the line from the water. A long handled di net is used to scoop up the crabs as they come to the surface, hanging onto the bait. Speed and skill are important when netting crabs. Big crabs often drop off as they near the surface.

**CRAB POTS** Crab pots are made of chicken wire. These cubeshaped traps are a few feet wide. There is a bait compartment and entry ports where crabs can enter but not exit. You leave a pot in a location for several hours and return to check it out. There can be a few dozen crabs in a single pot.

**COLLAPSIBLE TRAPS** The biggest crabs often drop off trotlines and hand lines. They didn't get big by being dumb. A trap will tackle the big Jimmies. Attach the bait in the center of the trap. Have a line from the trap to a milk jug for your float. You can use a small boat, canoe, or raft to run a line of traps. Check regulations for how many traps you can use. Approach the buoys stealthily and grab the lines. A quick snap will close the trap and catch the crab inside.

HAND LINES Crab lines are simple. Chalk line or cord will do. Use a bolt or heavy fishing weight to hold a chicken neck to the bottom. Toss them off a pier, shore, or gunwale. When the line pulls tight, gradually drag the crab into netting range. A long-handled wire net works best for the final scoop. The higher the pier, the longer the net. An 8-foot net is a good length. 2 crabbers work best. One can slowly retrieve the line while the other dips the net. It takes practice. Place the net into the water before the crab is at the surface, then scoop away.

DIP NETS/ ROLLER NETS Wading in the shallows and hunting swimming crabs is great fun. Wear a closed-toe pair of old sneakers. Long pants will keep any jellyfish off your legs. If you have a roller net, roll it through submerged grass beds. When crabs molt or sluff their shells, they hide in the grasses. The roller net will help to find them. Hard crabs are also in the grass to prey on these vulnerable crabs. Scoop them up as you go. Use an inner float tube with a bushel basket inside to hold the hard crabs. Place the soft crabs into a wet canvas bag and lay them on top.

You may need a boat for some of these methods. You can also crab from shorelines, beaches, jetties, and piers near your boats. If you are using a boat, toss out two anchors to hold the boat in place. Now toss out your hand lines. If you beach your boat, toss lines into the shallows and mark each with an attached stake. If you have fish heads, tie them to your hand lies and hang on!

Baits vary with personal choice and availability. Chicken necks, razor clams, bull lips, eels, and fish heads will do the trick. These baits can be tied onto a string, placed in web bags, or into bait containers to attract hungry crabs. When the bait is no longer fresh, crabs will not eat so keep your bait fresh.

Commercial crabbers use hundreds of pots across miles of trotlines to catch their limits of crabs. Boaters constantly try to avoid these pot buoys as they travel the bay. They are often in a line along dropoffs, channels, and weed beds.

Seasonal regulations change based on the weather and health of the crab population. Check for current regulations in the area you plan to fish before heading out. Some days may be just for commercial crabbing and others for recreational fishing. There are also size limits for soft crabs and hard crabs. Female crabs are also regulated.

Eating or picking crabs can be an adventure. Some say that crabs look like spiders. Check out some YouTube videos for different ways to pick out the wonderful crab meat. Picked crabs can be made into crab cakes and soup. Soft crabs can be cleaned, fried, and topped with a slice of fresh Maryland tomato and eaten whole!

There is something special about catching your own crabs. They just taste better.

## DONATING YOUR BOAT

I know you love her, but if she just isn't what you need anymore, maybe it's time to move on. You can choose to sell, demolish, or donate that old boat to clear the way to the new boat of your dreams. (What did you think I was talking about???)

For individuals who decide to make a boat donation, the IRS offers tax deductions at the fair market value for qualified gifts during a given tax year. This includes marine electronics such as fish finders, radar, autopilots, and other accessories. Because your boat donation is not monetary, the watercraft must be appraised at fair market value.

Charitable organizations are prohibited from assigning a value to donations, so identifying how much your boat is worth is very important. Find and compare the sales of similar boats in your area to determine current market value. Although not required it can also help to hire a professional, qualified marine surveyor for an appraisal. Appraisal guides are available to determine the anticipated market value of vessel donations like boatvalue.com or boats.com/nada-guides. By keeping good records of the history of your boat, with the help of a professional tax advisor, you can evaluate if you would benefit from filing a noncash charitable contribution form.

There are plenty of worthy non-profits who may want your boat. Some organizations require the engine to be in working order while other organizations will take a boat in "as is" condition. Most specify that your donation will support their mission to help a charitable group like veterans, cancer patients or the disabled.

I always contend that fishing is not about how big the fish is or how many you catch. Sure, we pride ourselves in catching quality and quantity, for it gives us a sense of accomplishment. The pleasure of fishing is just that. It's the joy we get from the day out in nature, setting the hook and fellowship with our fishing partner. That being said, one of my great joys in fishing is parking over big schools of white perch and jigging them up. I've had days when I have caught 100 fish and days where very few in school would cooperate. The tough days make me appreciate the great catches.

Summertime perch fishing is my favorite. The Patapsco River is my destination. In my years of fishing the P-taps, I have several spots that I can count to hold perch. These areas have several things in common. I am looking for hard bottom areas in 10 to 12 feet of water with tidal flow. White perch are as tide-dependent as most other species in the bay. We don't think about it as such, but they do have a predatory instinct and feed on minnows, small crabs, and grass shrimp that come their way. This is the reason why I choose to jig for perch versus bottom fishing for them.

You don't need heavy tackle to catch white perch. I find it takes the fun out of catching them. I use lite and ultralight spinning outfits spooled with 6-pound-test copolymer line. I don't use braided line because, for me, it's easier to dislodge jigs from snags found amongst the rocks and shells with copolymer line. This setup is more than adequate to hook and land perch. Should you hook to big black back perch, or two at a time, you will be challenged.

My tandem jig rig is tied with 10-pound-test fluorocarbon line so that one length is 18 inches and the other is 9 inches. I have found that if I use equal lengths, the rig will tangle on itself. I have 1/8-ounce ball head jigs tied on either end. I tie directly to the surgeon's loop on the rig.

I'll tip the jig heads with any of an assortment of soft plastics. Sizes range from 2 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> to 3 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-inches. I'll use both small fluke-type plastics and paddle tail minnows. The fluke-style baits are typically the longer of the baits. I can switch between colors and styles to find out which is working best. If I'm looking to keep a few of the larger perch, I'll use the larger soft baits.

There are times when the vertical approach of jigging doesn't pan out. One of the biggest clues is that you get your strike as you reel your rig back to the boat. This is when I reach for my second rod which has a spinner tied on. I use both inline spinners and beetle spin-like rigs, choosing a small twister tail or paddle tail to give the action.

Being geared up is a big part of catching white perch. However, in order to catch them, you have to find them first. The spots I fish are not small in nature. They can be 50 to 200 yards long. I'll start at one end and fan-cast my lure while keeping an eye on the electronics. The first bites will clue me in on which direction to go and the aggressive nature of the perch. The fish finder will show me the size and makeup of the school.

On a slack tide, the school will be flat along the bottom and the bites will be slow. Many times, letting the lure sit with barely a shake will get the bite. When the tidal current starts to flow, the school will stack up and the bite becomes more aggressive. This is when the fun begins. When a perch strikes my tandem rig, I'll set the hook and let it make a run. Often times a second perch will snatch the other jig while the first perch moves away.

Though it may be hot outside, white perch fishing should be as hot as the air temps. While the Patapsco River harbors my white perch spots, these tactics will work at similar spots on your favorite fishing grounds. Now is the time to have fun with white perch.


